This is a report on all Lancashire LGBT activities within the timeframe of the With Out Barriers (WOB) Project: December 1st 2016 – November 30th 2017

There has been an increase in information and support enquiries this year, with an increase in enquiries from Private Sector organisations. This is because some organisations which have a public function have been classified as private but this has now been clarified.

The top four topics have not changed, but enquiries about local information have more than doubled, as have enquiries regarding trans/gender identity issues. The top four geographic areas (when given) have changed, with Lancaster now ranking 3rd and Blackpool 4th.

Email is the most popular method of contacting us (n=122) followed by telephone (n=116). Community members are more likely to communicate with us by email and organisations, by telephone.

COMMUNITY EVENTS: 8 ATTENDANCE 545

WOB ACTIVITY

This year we took a leading role in the planning of LGBT History Month events in Lancashire. The programme included the LGBT Youth Fest in Blackpool, 4 performances of the "Burnley Plays" (which were all sold out), a film screening in Lancaster, and OUTing the Past events in Preston and Lancaster.

There was a total attendance of 545 at these 8 events which far surpassed attendance numbers at LGBT History Month events in Lancashire in recent years.

As a by-product, there were further sold-out performances of the Burnley Plays in Manchester and Liverpool, which attracted a further 240 attendees.

Lancashire LGBT will continue to take the lead in organising LGBT History Month events in 2018.

GROUPS: 730 ATTENDANCES

WOB ACTIVITY

109 new people attended regular groups directly supported or run by us.

Our walking group has seen consistent growth, with a total of 43 new attendees this year, out of a total of 146 attendances on the walk and an average attendance of 13 people per walk over the year.

The young people's LGBT and trans groups and the family group delivered in partnership with UR Potential saw a total of 57 new faces, out of a total of 96 people attending the groups this year. 18 young people attended a group at Fulwood Academy which we supported as a one-off.

Altogether, the groups saw a total of 730 attendances, including members still attending from the previous year,

- Go Out walking group 1/month (Jan-Nov)
- UR Potential groups: LGBT, Trans 2 of each/month and Family group 1/month- Total 5/month. (Our support for these groups has now ended.)

PRACTITIONER FORUM: 3 MEETINGS. 24 DIRECT BENEFICIARIES

WOB ACTIVITY

The Practitioner Forum, for people who run groups across the county, met 3 times this year. A total of 17 different representatives from 10 community groups and organisations attended, representing 295 group members.

We also organised Mental Health First Aid training for members, which was delivered by Mental Health First Aid North West and attended by an 11 people.

BEFRIENDING: 15 PEOPLE BEFRIENDED. 27 DIRECT BENEFICIARIES

WOB ACTIVITY

As part of the Trans Support Service, the Befriending Service aims to provide regular, low-level peer support to vulnerable trans people and/or their family members via telephone and e-mail. To date, 5 Volunteer Befrienders have been recruited, including a Befriender specifically for the parents of young trans people. The Volunteer Befrienders undertook specialist Befriending training (delivered by Lancashire Adult Learning) in August 2017, in addition to a range of induction focused e-learning courses.

There has been an unexpected demand for befriending services for the parents of trans young people – 12 families in 2017. We have been able to provide these families with befriending support thanks to our specialist Family Befriender. We have also been able to offer to befriending support to a trans woman in prison via letter through a 'Penpal' system.

Unfortunately, we have experienced a delay in formally launching the wider Trans Befriending Service due to administrative delays with DBS checks. The formal launch of the Befriending Service will take place in early 2018.

To date, the Befriending Service has offered support to 13 family members and 2 trans adults resulting in 27 direct beneficiaries of the service.

TRANS SUPPORT: 172 BENEFICIARIES

WOB ACTIVITY

The number of information and support enquiries involving trans beneficiaries (whether direct or indirect) was 73.

We had our annual trans residential weekend and also hosted 2 workshops with NHS Gender Identity Clinics, which were attended by 78 trans people and family members.

- Trans residential event at Borwick Hall: 21 attendees including 3 volunteers
- Leeds Gender Identity Clinic workshop: 32 attendees
- Tavistock Gender Identity Development Service (for Children and Young People) workshop: 46 attendees, of whom 18 were professionals and 28 were trans people/family members





These statistics are based on 1087 identified beneficiaries, including indirect beneficiaries but excluding organisations. The activities where we have been able to collect diversity information are:

The known sexual orientation, ethnicity, disability and faith figures are fairly low for Information & Support, as many email enquiries rarely mention the latter three; and sexual orientation is often unclear – for example, an enquiry from a female about a women's group could be either lesbian or bisexual, or indeed heterosexual (and trans).
